Getting started

Starting to read Exodus can be a bit like starting to watch a movie when its already half way through. Certain things have already happened which we need to be aware of. If we aren't aware of them we may not be able to make full sense of what's going on in Exodus. In particular we need to be aware of some promises that God has made to a person named Abram. Read Genesis 12:1-9. What sorts of things has God promised Abram (later on in Genesis God gives Abram the name Abraham).

How do you think Abram would have felt about these promises?




Chapters 25-31 of Exodus are all about God getting his people to build him a tabernacle, a giant tent structure, so that he and his people could be close.
